TRACTORS, FOOD, AND FUN AT FLYWHEELERS ANNUAL SHOW

BOYNE FALLS, MI – There will be many tractors and engines to see along with fun activities at the annual Northern Michigan Antique-Flywheelers (NMAF) show running Thursday, July 23, through Sunday, July 26. The 2026 show is featuring Hand Start Tractors and Diesel Stationary Engines. In an effort to provide affordable family fun, the Flywheelers Club has not changed the price of admission for over a decade; prices are still only \$7 for guests 13 and up, children 12 and under are free, and seniors 65 and over can get in for \$5 on Thursday.

Each year the club selects features for the show in the tractors and engines categories to encourage ever-changing equipment displays. “The great thing about choosing a feature of a tractor to showcase instead of a brand of tractor is that so many makes and models from an era can be included in the category,” said NMAF Club President Dave Korthase. “Choosing Hand Start Tractors means more fun for everyone to display and view some really neat old tractors.” Korthase pointed out that this is true for the planned 2027 feature, Family Heritage Tractors, as well.

As in past years, there is far more to see and do at the show than enjoy the tractors. The show’s daily opening ceremonies kickoff the exhibits and demonstrations at 9 AM. Don’t miss the buffet breakfast each day from 7 AM to 9 AM. Attractions at the show include the daily 2 PM tractor parade, antique autos, a large flea market, oil field engines, arts and craft vendors, the sawmill, the veneer mill and basket factory, the kiddie train, one-room schoolhouse, museums, and, of course, great food options at several venues on the showgrounds. Music is also a mainstay of the show with great local talent showcased. Every attendee of every age is sure to find something to enjoy.

The Northern Michigan Antique-Flywheelers Club is an educational nonprofit organization that uses demonstrations and displays to showcase “Life in the Past Lane” and to present many aspects of daily life in rural northern Michigan in the early part of the 1900s. The club is an all-volunteer group that invites the public to learn about the past at its annual show the last full weekend of July each summer. It also annually hosts more than one thousand area fourth graders over a four day period in September for Student Harvest Days. The showgrounds are located on US-131 between Boyne Falls and Walloon Lake.
